

Brazilian Linguistics Association (Abralin)

Abralin (Brazilian Linguistics Association) is a nonprofit association that aims to bring together linguistics professionals to promote, develop and publish theoretical and applied linguistic studies. It was founded in 1969 and presently has +5000 members. Every year, Abralin promotes several academic meetings in different regions in Brazil. Its main meeting is the International Conference, which takes place every other year. The last one (abralin.org/abralin50) celebrated the 50th anniversary of the association and brought together +2000 linguists from all over the world. In 2019, the International Year of Indigenous Languages, we are organising an important event to bring together members of indigenous communities, students and researchers from universities, museums and other research and documentation institutions to discuss, exchange and foster the development of actions of preservation, revitalisation and resumption of indigenous and minority languages: Viva Língua Viva (vlv19.abralin.org). Abralin publishes an academic journal, Revista da Abralin (<http://revista.abralin.org/index.php/abralin>), and a magazine for the popularisation of linguistics, Roseta (<http://www.roseta.org.br>). The association is committed to promote equality, diversity and inclusion, by respecting the whole spectrum of human diversity as to race, ethnicity, gender identity, age, socio-economic status, disability, nationality, sexual preference and beliefs. In order to achieve its goals, the association promotes scientific meetings, courses and publications, provides scholarships and cooperates with public and private entities in education programs addressing linguistic issues.
